

CLOSE-READING QUESTIONS:

1. The commander of the American army is General George Washington. Storch hates Washington because he and his friend are on England's side—they are not rooting for the Americans to win the war.
2. Theo accidentally hits Storch on the head with a stick he is pretending is a pirate's sword. He's spinning around with it when he stumbles and lets go, and the stick hits Storch on the back of the head. Nate takes the blame for Theo so that Storch won't sell Theo, who is a slave.
3. Nate remembers the stories his father told him about the pirate Slash O'Shea, who ran away from an orphanage at age 10 and got a job on a ship. He plans to go to Norwalk Harbor and catch a boat to New York City, which has one of the busiest harbors in the colonies with ships departing for places all over the world. In New York City, he plans to talk a captain into hiring him.
4. Nate notices that these ships are much bigger than regular sailing ships. They have twelve sails each, and square openings on their sides through which he can see cannon muzzles. When he sees the English flags on their masts, he realizes they are British warships.
5. Paul tells Nate that the people of Boston were like prisoners. The British moved into any house they wanted, there wasn't enough food, and the shops were all shut down. The American soldiers in the militia felt they had to do something to get the British out.

10. Nate learns that Storch has died and that he is to inherit all of Storch's assets, so he returns to Norwalk. His return is important to Eliza and Theo because it he can now give them their freedom papers.
